

The following homily was given by **Fr. Anthony Chantry**, to participants who graduated on 4^{th} June, 2014 at the Institute of St. Anselm, in Cliftonville. These participants, from twenty different nationalities, had just completed their nine months or six months' programmes.

NEW WINE ...

'If you want to produce a truly good wine, one that will excite your sense of smell and explode with flavour when it hits your palate, then long before grapes are picked and pressed the vine needs to be challenged and cared for. The vine-yard can teach us much about our human growth into what God intends us to be.

Really fine wine usually comes from grapes that have come from a vine that struggles. The greater the struggle, the finer the wine. Vines grown on rich, fertile land will produce great quantities of very mediocre wine of superficial character.

Vines growing on rough and rocky hillsides must sink their roots deep into the relatively poor soil in order to find the life-giving nutrients. There will be fewer grapes and therefore a lower volume of wine produced but what potential there is for the Master Winemaker to create something very special!

The fruit we bear in our own lives is directly related to the way we struggle to be authentic in meeting life's serious challenges. The Christian narrative is full of exemplars. Mary, Mother of the Lord, responded to her scandalising pregnancy with the lifegiving "yes" to God that changed the world. Peter's denial of Christ led him to discover the life-changing forgiveness of God and changed the course of history. St Paul, struck down by his own consummate guilt and blinded by God's love, changed from self-righteous persecutor to model missionary. The struggles of these disciples have produced a rich harvest for us all.

Like the vine, our struggle to grow has the potential to bear the finest fruit: a crisis of faith may lead to deeper faith; poor health or bad luck may help us discover what is really important in life; and sin can make us humble, non-judgemental and forgiving. Vines, precisely because they are vines, need support. Variously shaped trestles are employed to support the vines and keep them healthy while they soak up the sun's rays, and are washed by gentle showers and brushed by cool breezes.

Our journey of growth is a joint venture. We need each other to grow and the great call to holiness and wholeness is only achievable when we affirm each other in our strengths and support each other in our weaknesses.

Correct pruning of the vines always leads to growth. Once the fruit is harvested, the dying leaves and branches are cut back to mere stalks; the deep roots remain secure as they are now locked into the terrain ready to provide fresh fruit in due season. If we are to continue to bear good fruit, then we must allow God, through human agency, to cut away from our lives all that prevents us from growing in God for others. The dead wood of arrogance, harshness, judgementalism, roughness, ingratitude, impatience and bitterness will then give way to fresh young shoots of humility, kindness, compassion, gentleness, thankfulness, patience and joy. Be warned: pruning is a painful process and while the vine may not feel it, we do!

The Institute of St Anselm is a very effective and indeed beautiful vineyard and has produced countless harvests of missionary disciples including all of you at the Graduation Mass.

You have struggled to find what gives you true life; what nourishes you and makes you grow strong. You have supported each other and been encouraged by professional and caring staff. You have discovered the gift of loving friendship with each other as a vital support for growth. The pruning may have been painful yet we cannot grow without it, and the skilled hand of the vine-dresser is gentle.

Now you are ready for the next stage of your life of missionary discipleship. God has chosen you, you did not choose him. He loves each of you deeply, uniquely, beyond measure, and challenges you to abide in his love. He sends you out into the world to reach out to those in need of the joy that the Gospel brings.

May your roots run deep into the mystery of God. May your pruning be gentle and life-giving. May you find the support you need to live as missionary disciples of the Lord: loving, serving, thanking, and bearing fruit in abundance!'





The Institute of St. Anselm, which opened in Mill Hill on Monday, 14th October, 1985, is the first of its kind in Great Britain — and has been warmly welcomed by many congregations who have had, until now, to send members to America or Rome for specialised formation courses.

The Institute opens with 34 students from all over the world, from America, England, Holland, Ireland, Italy, Kenya, Germany, Scotland, South Africa, Sri Lanka, Sweden, Thailand and Zimbabwe.

Several have recently returned from missionary work, in such countries as Botswana, Kenya, Philippines, Trinidad, etc. There are 14 priests and brothers and 19 sisters

The participants have come together as prospective Rectors, Novice Masters/Mistresses, Superiors and Leaders to prepare themselves to meet the challenge of their important work

The students, from these different cultures and countries, will live in community for the year. They will study, recreate, and above all pray and celebrate all aspects of the liturgy together. This multi-cultural experience will be an enrichment as they reflect upon relationships and community living, sharing their experiences. They will gain greater understanding of each other learning to be sensitive to the various needs within the group.

Experts from the different fields of psychology and spirituality will provide the necessary stimulus and information for a better and deeper understanding of human growth and development of the whole person

1990 - 1992

By 1991, 350 Participants had received a Diploma at St Anselm. Community Groups were introduced.

In 1992 there were 88 Participants from 30 nationalities and a staff of 16, adding 2 more nationalities. There were 49 Sisters, 30 Priests and 9 Brothers.




